WELCOME TO INTERIM PASTOR:

PASTOR APRIL ULRING LARSON

On Monday, August 26th, a new, and also familiar, face appeared in the halls of Good Shepherd. With a simple turning of the key, she entered the Good Shepherd Pastor's Office, organized her books on the shelves, and has begun her ministry among us. With gratitude we share that Pastor April Ulring Larson has accepted our call to serve us as our third interim pastor of 2024. Good Shepherd

has been blessed by the care, leadership, and gifts of these three excellent pastors – Pastor David Wrightsman, Pastor Marion Pruitt Jefferson, and Pastor April Ulring Larson - who have responded to our call through the nudging of the Holy Spirit. Pastor April shared her respect and gratitude for the thorough and smooth transition from Pastor Marion Pruitt Jefferson to herself, describing this as "a hand-off that can be compared to Olympian excellence." While Pastor April is new to some members of our congregation, she and her husband Pastor Judd W. Larson, are also very well-known and valued to members with a longer history at Good Shepherd.

Pastor April was born and raised in Decorah, where she was baptized, confirmed, married, and an active member of Decorah Lutheran Church. Pastor April has known Good Shepherd from its founding. The children of the first families were her friends and classmates, and she has known all of the pastors who have served Good Shepherd throughout its history. Pastor Judd was born and raised in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. He was baptized, confirmed, and an active member of First Lutheran Church in Sioux Falls. They met as young adults at the ELCA camp Wilderness Canoe Base in the boundary waters of Minnesota, and they were married at Decorah Lutheran Church. During their first two years of marriage, they lived in Decorah, while Judd finished his last two years at Luther (he will soon be celebrating his 50th class reunion!), and April taught music in the Catholic School in Cresco. During those two years, they were members at Washington Prairie Lutheran. Pastor April directed the adult and youth choirs, there, and Judd served as part-time custodian. They were also the volunteer youth directors. They spent the next four years at Wartburg Theological Seminary, becoming pastors in February, 1978. Pastors April and Judd served their first eleven years as co-pastors in Iowa. She valued diverse opportunities and experiences, including serving as the Global Music leadership song leader and choral director beginning with the (1984) ALCW Convention in Detroit, then serving at several national Global Mission Events (GME) in the ELCA

In February 1989, Pastor April accepted the call to be Assistant to the Bishop in the Southeastern Minnesota Synod, ELCA. In the summer of 1992, five years after the birth of the ELCA, Pastor April became the first Lutheran woman bishop in the U.S., and the second in the world. Pastor April served sixteen years as Bishop of the La Crosse (Wisconsin) Area Synod. In this period, Pastor Judd served as a parish pastor in La Crosse. ...continued on next page

WELCOME TO INTERIM PASTOR: PASTOR APRIL ULRING LARSON

Following Pastor April's maximum allowable three terms of service, she returned to parish ministry in 2008, accepting the call as Senior Pastor of First Lutheran Church in Duluth, Minnesota. In 2010 Pastor Judd joined her there as a staff pastor. Pastor April has rich experiences working with all types of congregations in transition, crisis, or celebration.

After 36 years of active ordained service, Pastors April and Judd returned to Decorah in 2014 to retire. Their retirement was interrupted when April had the joy of serving as interim pastor at Good Shepherd for 9 months, between the ministries of Pastor Mau and Pastor Amy Zalk Larson, and then as interim pastor at Washington Prairie Lutheran Church. Pastor Judd served three semesters as an Interim Campus Pastor at Luther College during this time. Additionally, Pastor April has served as a Regent at Luther College for sixteen years. She has received three honorary doctorates, one of them from Luther College. They moved to lowa City in December 2021.

All three of their children are Luther College graduates. Their twin daughters, Katie Larson Ode MD and Amy Calhoun MD are physicians and Professors at the University of Iowa Children's Hospital and Medical School. Their son Ben was one semester away from becoming a pastor when he died in the Haiti earthquake on January 12th, 2010 while doing ministry there. We will have the joy and honor this fall of worshipping with the liturgy Ben composed, "Behold, I Make All Things New."

Pastors April and Judd share many hobbies, including seeing their eight grandchildren and working on their cabin in northwest Minnesota a few miles west of Itasca State Park. Perhaps at some time we will get a taste of Pastor Judd's homemade applesauce!

Pastor April shares that after serving her first time as interim here, they missed Good Shepherd, which she values as "an amazing congregation." In consultation with Pastor Amy Zalk Larson, they joyfully became Associate Members of Good Shepherd. Pastor April shares, "Faith is a gift, yet a gift given in community." She concludes, "Judd and I are so excited to walk with you in the great mission in which the Holy Spirit is leading Good Shepherd."

We welcome, with gratitude, Pastor April Ulring Larson, Bishop Emerita. On Sunday, September 8th, there will be a Service of Installation included within our worship service.

In this we made a commitment to have all volunteers and staff undergo background checks and have a minimum of 2 adults present with youth at all times.

We hope to see you there - along with a friend or neighbor or two! Here are the details for the different volunteer roles:

All Food/Drink donations:

- When signing up please add comments about what you will be making in the "Comment" box as able
- Please bring to the Church kitchen by 4:30 on Sunday the 15th with a serving utensil
- Label all dishes and serving utensils with your name so they make it back to you
- Please label any dietary notes (GF, V, Dairy free, etc.) as applicable. Note cards will be available in the GS Kitchen.

Sunday Setup:

Outdoor:

- Assemble rectangle tables and chairs along courtyard perimeter with tables & chairs from the annex.
- Cover tables in tablecloths.
- Place flowers on tables.

• Indoor:

- Help set the drinks, desserts, and salads/sides tables.
- Place flowers on tables.

<u>Greeter at Nametag Table -</u> depending on line length, walk the line/go to the end and welcome people there as well.

- Greet folks and invite them to put on a name tag.
- Keep a tally of people that come (as able it's ok if its a rough estimate)
- Most likely also help direct folks to the restroom as needed.
- Set up "Welcome to Good Shepherd" cards at the welcome table by the name tags

Beverage Maker:

• Make coffee & decaf coffee before picnic and at least 1 time throughout as needed.

Food Helper: 4:30-5:30 Slot

- Make sure dishes/utensils are labeled with the person's name when they drop items off and there are dietary labels as appropriate (GF, DF, V, etc.)
- Help stock the serving tables as folks drop things off (dessert, drink, and side/chips tables)

Food Helper: 5:30-6:30 Slot

• Help keep the serving tables stocked with food from the kitchen. Take out empty dishes and utensils and rinse them.

Drink Server: 5-6:30

- Serve drinks/fill cups at the drink table
- Can split the time between 2 people (5-5:45, 5:45-6:30) if wanted

Assist with Carrying Food to tables: 5-6:30

• During the event float around the serving stations offering to help as you see needed. Can split the time between 2 people (5-5:45, 5:45-6:30) if wanted

Dishes/Garbage

- Set out and maintain plates, napkins, silverware, and cups on the table. We will be using all disposable products.
- Set up recycling and trash bins from the kitchen outside in places you think appropriate and place full bags in the large outdoor bins by the Annex. Replace trash bags with new ones found under the kitchen sink.

Kids Activity Leader & Helpers

• Help participate/lead games! Set out balls, bubbles, chalk, etc. Supplies available from the Office.

Hot Dog Roaster

• Heat hotdogs in the oven then place in roasters in the FH serving window.

Kitchen Cleanup

- Kitchen clean up should be happening throughout the event as possible
- Clean up kitchen as needed help with any food related cleaning/storing/labeling.
- As much as possible, food and dishes should be taken home by the people that brought them.

Cleanup Outdoors & indoors

- Gather tablecloths & centerpieces, wipe off tables,
- Outdoors only: help take down extra tables & chairs and return them to the Annex.
- Walk through and pick up any garbage/trash in the yard.
- Vacuum FH

 - October 24, 2-4 pm **Indigenous Thought and Theology,** an introduction to the wisdom of the indigenous ways of understanding, respecting and interacting with this wondrous world we inhabit.

- Good Shepherd's Land Acknowledgement Task Force (Linda Donoghue, Elizabeth Kaschins, and Anne Clausen) has been studying the peoples who lived on this land before they were removed by the US Government to open the land for European settlers. - Calling for a Blanket Dance (by Oscar Hokeah, 2002, the Luther College summer reading for 2024 on Native Americans living in what is now Oklahoma)
- The Seed Keeper (by Diane Wilson, 2021, the All Iowa Reads book for 2024 on Dakota Native Americans living in Minnesota from the 19th century to the present)
- Custer Died for Your Sins: An Indian Manifesto (by Vine Deloria, 1969, a series of essays that critique various efforts to "help" Native Americans, which has been recommended by Vance Blackfox of the ELCA).

If you're interested in forming a book study or discussion, let the Racial Justice team know and we can help organize something.
