RACIAL JUSTICE SPOTLIGHT

Why should we continually strive to do better?

Good Shepherd is a congregation with a commitment to strive for social justice in its DNA. One does not need to repeat here all the initiatives the congregation took on in all these years. One essential element of this commitment is the strong sentiment of making people feel they belong here. From the work of engaging in receiving South Asian refugees to the work of supporting AMPARO passing through the process of becoming a Reconciling in Christ Congregation, all show this critical aspect of caring for neighbors and that all people are welcome at Good Shepherd is central to our identity as a Lutheran congregation.


In recent years, a new element has become important in our congregational life: our commitment to racial justice. After the approval of our Racial Justice Statement, some concrete actions have already taken place to make the words that appear on the Racial Justice Statement more tangible. In 2022, the Worship and Music Committee encouraged ...continued on next page

the congregation to explore the concept of reparations for using Spirituals in our worship, acknowledging that the original authors were never compensated. This dialogue resulted in a commitment of \$500 in the annual budget, an amount similar to what is allocated for other music aimed at supporting Black musicians today.

Now, we want to invite the entire congregation to embark on a new process of discernment and action. Why? Our Racial Justice Statement states that we "will actively pursue racial justice in all aspects of our congregational life and make changes to adopt antiracist policies and practices around worship, education, advocacy, stewardship, governance, and through our community partnerships and relationships." This bold commitment requires ongoing listening, learning, and action.

Concretely, how will we achieve this? Using Kerry Connelly's book *Wait—Is This Racist?* A Guide to Becoming an Anti-Racist Church, we are inviting each of the standing committees of Good Shepherd to embark on the journey to learn about what it means to be an antiracist congregation and to discern and commit to the next steps each group will take to live out our Racial Justice Statement. Each committee is invited to find its own approach and determine the timeline for this work, depending on their regular work cycle. The Racial Justice Team will support, help find resources, and keep the congregation informed of the work that is underway so our efforts are increasingly visible within and beyond the congregation.



If individuals other than committee members want to read the book, copies will be available in the library and available for purchase from the church office.

Maya Angelou said, "Do the best you can until you know better. Then, when you know better, do better." Connelly's book *Wait—Is This Racist*? is an excellent opportunity to learn more so that we can do better.

CLIMATE CHANGE ACTION GROUP: Decorah Middle School Presentation

The Climate Change Action Group (CCAG) is made up of 6th, 7th, and 8th Graders from Decorah Middle School hoping to take action to help mitigate climate change impacts in this community and the overall planet. This group is a voluntary group of students willing to put time and effort into doing things as a group for the betterment of the environment and the larger community. This is a group that is intended to amplify student voices. This group has a teacher/advisor, Mr. Boylen, to help navigate and communicate between the students and the adults.

The group is currently working on presenting about how to create a more sustainable and hopefully net-zero energy-use school along with one having much more outdoor play and large windows for natural lighting. They will be sharing a presentation of their work this Sunday during an Adult Forum. People of all ages are welcome.

In her message to the church, Bishop Eaton noted that the purpose of the Truth and Healing Movement in the ELCA is to:

- Learn the true history and current realities of Indigenous people. It is these truths, truths that have been ignored by most for hundreds of years, that will bring healing for both Indigenous people and non-Indigenous people.
- Increase understanding of our colonizing impacts on indigenous people in the past and present.
- Focus on right and healthy relationships with indigenous people on Turtle Island.

Knowing and embracing the truth is the first step for all of us. The ELCA published "A Declaration of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to American Indian and Alaska Native People," in which the church confesses its sins toward Indigenous peoples. It also lists the commitments it will begin working toward as it responds to its original "Repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery" from 2016.

One commitment found in each document is to formally acknowledge the original inhabitants of North America. The declaration states, "We commit to begin the practice of land acknowledgement at all expressions of the church."

This is arguably one of the easier commitments, though it should never be thought of as simple or meaningless. Land acknowledgements are indeed meaningful and play a crucial part in combating erasure of Indigenous peoples. They are a ritual of respect and gratitude for the land and for Indigenous peoples from whom the land was taken.

We began our journey toward truth and healing at Good Shepherd when the Racial Justice Team (RJT) appointed a task force to draft one or more land acknowledgement statements for discussion and consideration by the RJT, develop recommendations for how a Land Acknowledgement statement would be used by Good Shepherd, and share the RJT-approved statement with the congregation for discussion and feedback.

To date, using indigenous resources and Library of Congress records, we have conducted extensive research on tribal nations who lived on this sacred land and on the importance of the land to them. We drafted a statement that acknowledges the tribes, the impacts of forced removal and assimilation, and what we need to do on our journey, led by the Spirit, to seek truth and healing that honors the land itself and the indigenous people who have cared for it throughout generations...continued on next page

As we continue our work, we would like to share with you each month an article on each of the tribes/nations who resided on the land we now own and care for. Each article will have a link to their voices today. It's not just about the past, but also a look at our brothers and sisters today and what they choose to share with us about the present. Perhaps, as we get to know them, we can envision their faces and voices each time we use the land acknowledgement statement and maintain a meaningful connection with them.

WALDORF UNIVERSITY NOW AN EPIC SCHOLARSHIP PARTNER

The Executive Director of the Western Iowa Synod of the ELCA has announced that Waidorf University (formerly Waldorf Lutheran College) in Forest City, Iowa has become a partner in the EPIC (Education Partners in Covenant) ministry of the ELCA. As a result, Waldorf will partner with participating ELCÀ churches providing matches to the local churches EPIC scholarships. The Waldorf match will be 100% up to \$1000. For members of the Good Shepherd congregation this means that any Good Shepherd student who selects Waldorf will now be eligible for the Good Shepherd EPIC scholarship. As an EPIC partner, Waldorf will match our scholarship 100%. Each student receiving \$1000 from Good Shepherd will also receive another \$1000 from.Waldorf. Good Shepherd currently has five members of the congregation who are receiving our scholarship for the 2024--2025 academic year. Those students are attending Gustavus, Concordia and Luther. In the past Wartburg and Valparasio have had Good Shepherd members attending those institutions. The Good Shepherd EPIC Scholarship Committee is pleased to now include Waldorf as a partner in this educational ministry.

BISHOP EATON ADDRESSES HATE TOWARDS HAITIAN COMMUNITY

You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt (Deuteronomy 10:19).

Dear church,

The recent national spotlight on Haitian immigrants in Springfield, Ohio, clearly has fanned flames of hate and stoked threats of violence. The rhetoric has created discord and mistrust of people who have already suffered civil unrest in their nation and been granted legal protection in the United States. History shows us that this kind of hatred often carries negative national and global consequences. Our church teaches that immigrants are children of God, made in God's image and worthy of respect and lives of dignity. God calls us to witness boldly to this truth when people tell dehumanizing lies that perpetuate racist tropes and support white supremacist narratives.

As people of faith, we and others look to God's command to "not bear false witness against your neighbor" (Exodus 20:16). Martin Luther explains: "We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light" (Martin Luther, Small Catechism, Eighth Commandment; Book of Concord, page 353).

Recognizing historic discriminatory policies and treatment of African descent immigrants, the ELCA has specific commitments to strengthen advocacy, protection and accompaniment of Black migrants. The ELCA participates in and promotes the United Nations International Decade for People of African Descent. We stand in solidarity with the Haitian community in the United States. We pray alongside Bishop Suzanne Darcy Dillahunt and the Southern Ohio Synod, Wittenberg University and Springfield area congregations responding to hateful speech and threats of violence in their communities.

Please pray and take action to stop the spread of hate. As followers of Christ, we are called to love neighbors. Below are resources to support this call.

A TRIBUTE FOR HARLEY REFSAL: HIS LEGACY OF ART AT GOOD SHEPHERD

As you walk around the Good Shepherd building, you will notice the astounding amount of art created and designed by congregation members. The late noted artist, Harley Refsal, was a significant contributor of this art and the sole creator or team member for some of the most visible and significant art for our congregation.



One of the most visible examples of Harley's work is the **Paschal Candle Holder** which he designed, built and carved. The stand is constructed from oak to match the other furnishings in the sanctuary while the carving is in butternut. Exemplifying the theme, "Gods Work, Our Hands," it features upraised children's and adult's hands in a variety of sizes, shapes, and conditions lifting or holding up the candle. Placed between the altar and baptismal font, the Paschal Candle remains in the chancel area throughout the year although is removed from Maundy Thursday to the Easter Vigil.



The **Shepherd's Cross** is another very visible example of Harley's artistic design expertise. Installed in 1989 at the front of the sanctuary between the weavings, this unique piece is an artistic combination of a cross and a shepherd's crook. While Harley originated the design concept, congregation members Reg Laursen created several life-size models from which the Congregation Council could make a selection, Hung Van Pham constructed the cross, and Stanley "Slim" Maroushek purposely roughed and finished the wood.



David Faldet and Harley, in collaboration with the Ad Hoc Art Subcommittee, designed and created the **Processional Cross** in 2017 which we view during all services. The design elements use a variety of local materials that link us to our environment. Wood from several tree varieties, a fossil, clay, and repurposed items (including an old hoe handle and iron bar) are used on the two sided cross. The prominent design element on the front side is a cross-on-a-cross, a visual reminder of the body on the original cross. On the backside, the clay shell medallion mounted in the center on blue carved wood connects us to our baptismal font and baptism. *continued on next page...*

A TRIBUTE FOR HARLEY REFSAL: HIS LEGACY OF ART AT GOOD SHEPHERD

Other art created by Harley is used seasonally for special occasions. He constructed the **Advent Wreath** and **Candle Holder**, designed with four candle holders, used during the Advent season. As a member of the Landscape Subcomittee, Harley helped plant the Christmas trees in the outdoor pots starting in Advent and to decorate the trees, he carved **gold Stars and red Cardinals**. In 2022, Harley carved a series of life-sized **Birds** painted in pastels for use as part of our Fellowship Hall décor. Perched on carved sticks, the birds are used as centerpieces throughout the spring season.

With the legacy of these gifts from Harley, Good Shepherd has been immeasurably enriched by the contributions of this remarkable artist, colleague, and friend.
