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
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## A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Lenten Theme 2025: "Lord Jesus, You Are Our Song As We Journey"

Beloved in Jesus,
Forty-one years ago at dawn on
this day, February 27, 1984, I gave
birth to our son, Ben. Even before
his shoulders were out he sang his
first song which was certainly
music to our ears. The doctor
exclaimed, "That's what we like,
one hundred percent out of the
chute." Ben's first breath was that
song, that first cry of new life.

Twenty five years later, Ben's beloved wife Renee was crawling all over the roof of that crumbling, shaking St Joseph's in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. searching for a way to Ben. Bloodied, Al cried out, "I hear him singing." Determined to get to Ben, Renee dangerously crawled back down to the hole from which she had escaped. She heard Ben singing. By then he was at the last verse of "The Lamb of God" (ELW setting 10). Faintly, Renee heard Ben sing with his last breath, "O Lamb of God, you bear the sin of all the world away; eternal peace with God you made:



God's peace to us we pray." Ben sang with his first breath and sang with his last breath.

This is my prayer for you as we walk into our 40-day journey in Lent: "God's peace to us, we pray." Every week our Lenten journey is interrupted by a Sunday, because every Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Even in this most solemn season of Lent, each Sunday we are reminded there is no sorrow on earth that

is not interrupted and, yes, overpowered by God's promise and resurrection actions of new life. Death never has the last word. God's word to us is always, Yes! In Second Corinthians 1:20 the Apostle Paul writes, "For in Jesus every one of God's promises is a 'Yes'."

On Ash Wednesday, we remember our mortality. The words spoken over the first human, Adam, are spoken over us: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return." (Genesis 3:19). I remember the first time Pastor Judd and I, as our daughters' pastors, put the ashes on our little twins' foreheads. In my heart I cried out to God, "No, not these ones God. Not our little daughters." And yet we marked their foreheads with the same ashes and spoke the same words we said to every one of those dear parishioners that Ash Wednesday decades ago, "You are dust and to dust you shall return."

Every week of this Lenten penitential season is interrupted by the celebration of our Lord Jesus Christ's Resurrection, because every Sunday is a celebration of Christ's Resurrection. Yes, we mark this penitential season with a more austere sanctuary, increased moments of silence and prayers, less ornate music and some repetitive acapella songs, then followed by a simple weekly soup supper. Most importantly, we gather around the cross and listen and pray and sing together.

Our theme for the season is, "Lord Jesus, You Are Our Song As We Journey." Each week we will sing a verse or two of hymn 808. Each week we will hear sermons on the "Theology of the Cross" as it is lived out in a context each Lenten preacher knows personally and deeply. Martin Luther repeated constantly, "The only true theology is a theology of the cross, not the false theology of glory." We need to be constantly reminded by Luther and Apostle Paul, the Gospel writers and the entire Scriptures, of our God who is revealed most clearly, not in glory but in the cross, in weakness, in suffering, in loss, in loneliness, pain, and sorrow.

Our Lenten preachers are members of our worshipping community here at Good Shepherd. Thank you all for agreeing to teach and preach Jesus and the Theology of the Cross among us this Lenten Season! Watch for more detail and a poster of our Midweek Lenten preachers coming soon.

As broken sinful human beings of the world, we all prefer the Theology of Glory. The Theology of Glory is the preferred theology of humanity and profoundly our American culture. Jesus' Beatitudes in Luke and in Matthew drip with the Theology of the Cross. Mother Mary's Magnificat is filled with the Theology of the Cross, as is Simeon's song to Jesus' parents. So also is Jesus' Inaugural Address in Luke.

Just a couple of weeks ago, an Evangelical Pastor read the Beatitudes to his congregation. Members came up to him after the worship angrily accusing him of proclaiming politics from the pulpit. The pastor responded, "I was merely reading the words of Jesus in Matthew 5." They responded, "Those words are not true anymore. They are too weak." This response dismisses some of the few words directly spoken by Jesus in the scriptures: "Blessed are the poor, those who mourn, the meek, those who hunger, the merciful, those who weep, the pure in heart, the peacemakers, the persecuted." Yes, Blessed are the weak!

In these newsletter pages, you will see your Good Shepherd prayers answered with wonderful news from our Call Committee and President. Good Shepherd also has good news about the May 1st start of new Luther graduate Gabby Bizal. She has accepted the twofold, now combined position of Youth Director and Ministry and Communications Coordinator at Good Shepherd. We are so excited! We will have a special "Gabby day" to welcome and begin to get to know Gabby Bizal on April 23rd. More information about this faithful and gifted sister in Christ, who joins our staff at Good Shepherd, will be coming in our April newsletter.

#### YOUTH LENTEN PROJECT SUPPORTS LUTHERAN SERVICES IN IOWA

The Good Shepherd Education Committee is excited to announce that this

year's Lenten Project, sponsored by Good Shepherd Sunday School children and youth, will raise funds for Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI), one of the largest nonprofit human services agencies in Iowa.



The GS Sunday School youth selected LSI because they wanted to support Lutheran aid organizations that have been targeted nationally and within lowa. Additionally, the students felt that it was important to remind the congregation of the critical work done each day across lowa by LSI. The GS Sunday School children and youth's goal is to raise \$5,000 for LSI.

Throughout the Lenten season, GS children and youth will work together during Sunday School to write offering prayers. They will then share these prayers, along with a LSI fact, during services each Wednesday and Sunday, beginning on Ash Wednesday and continuing through Palm Sunday.

## MESSAGE FROM LUTHERAN SERVICES

What does it mean to be part of a faith community? It's a question being asked in many places across our country today.

At Lutheran Services in America, being the public witness means putting our faith into action every day—Grace, Care, and Service embodied.

My faith journey began with my parents in the Appalachian foothills of Kentucky. There aren't many Lutherans in eastern Kentucky, so being Lutheran meant gathering in house church, attending confirmation in small groups, and participating in ecumenical youth groups. We were Lutheran because my parents chose to be, drawn to its message of grace and service. The values they instilled in me were not just personal; they were part of a much larger story—one rooted in Lutheran teachings that call us to care for one another in tangible ways.

Martin Luther taught that being saved by grace frees each of us to serve others. He put this into practice by establishing the Common Chest, a fund to support orphans, widows, education, and medical care. This wasn't just charity—it was a way to break cycles of poverty and build a stronger, more compassionate community. In the mid-1800s, as many Lutherans and other denominations fled hunger, violence, and persecution, they established churches in America. Deaconesses and clergy led the building of schools, hospitals, and care institutions for orphaned children, seniors, and veterans—laying the foundation for modern social ministry. Luther's teachings helped unleash the collective power of the broader faith community, launching a powerful legacy of purpose and hope.

I am reminded daily that faith is not only personal—it is communal, woven into the acts of kindness, service, and love that connect us all.

Today we are a vibrant network of more than 300 Lutheran social ministry organizations in 1,400 communities across the country rooted in a long-standing Lutheran faith tradition of service in caring for our neighbor. This work includes strengthening families, upholding the dignity, independence, and choice of older adults, championing full and meaningful lives for people with disabilities, and fostering stability and purpose for veterans and others.

You are a vital part of our mission! Together, we are the public witness.

## MESSAGE FROM BISHOP EATON IN SUPPORT OF JERUSALEM PARTRIARCHS ON GAZA:

Dear church,

Recently, the Patriarchs and Heads of the Churches in Jerusalem issued an urgent plea to the global church, "A Humanitarian Plea From the Churches of Jerusalem: Defending the Dignity and Presence of the People of Gaza." I write to uplift the timely and crucial words of these beloved siblings in Christ in Jerusalem and to call on our church to respond in prayer, action and solidarity.

This humanitarian plea from ecumenical church leaders in Jerusalem, including our partner church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, comes in the wake of comments from the president of the United States that outline a plan to forcibly and permanently displace roughly 2 million Gazans, with the stated goal of clearing Gaza for future real estate development.

The words of our brothers in Christ are clear:

"Amid this anguish, we are compelled to speak against the grave threat of mass displacement, an injustice that strikes at the very heart of human dignity. The people of Gaza, families who have lived for generations in the land of their ancestors, must not be forced into exile. ... As Christians, we cannot be indifferent to such suffering, for the Gospel commands us to uphold the dignity of every human being. The words of our Lord remind us: 'Woe to those who make unjust laws, to those who issue oppressive decrees, to deprive the poor of their rights and withhold justice from the oppressed' (Isaiah 10:1-2)."

Today our siblings in Gaza need our voices, our prayers and our actions more than ever.

Good Shepherd WELCA and the Good Shepherd EPIC Scholarship Ministry Committee will host an Easter Potluck Dinner at 11:30 on Easter Sunday in the Fellowship Hall. The dinner will be an all-congregation potluck meal and will serve as a fundraiser for both the Mission Assistance Fund and the Mission Endowment Fund. Freewill offerings will be divided equally between the two ministries. Meat will be provided and members of the congregation are asked to bring a side dish, bread, or dessert. Guests are welcome.

The Good Shepherd Mission Assistance Fund provides financial assistance for those in the community in need, regardless of church affiliation. The fund is administered by the Pastor in consultation with two advisory members of the congregation.

The Mission Endowment Fund is the congregation's vehicle for funding the EPIC Scholarship Ministry. Each year the EPIC Scholarship/Mission Endowment Fund Committee is authorized by the congregation to utilize 4% of the MEF to award a \$1000 EPIC scholarship to each member of the congregation attending an ELCA college.

Service for the Easter Potluck Dinner will be provided by WELCA, the EPIC Scholarship Ministry Committee, and current scholarship recipient families. Plan now to celebrate the joy of Easter with your Good Shepherd family.

#### Dear WELCA Members,

On behalf of the EPIC Scholarship/Mission Endowment Fund Committee I thank you for the generous donation that your made to the Mission Endowment Fund recently. Your gift is very much appreciated and needed.

As you know, the Mission Endowment Fund is the vehicle for funding the Good Shepherd EPIC Scholarship Ministry. This academic year the EPIC Scholarship Committee awarded six \$1000 scholarships to Good Shepherd members attending ELCA colleges. It appears that we will have seven next year and as many as ten the following academic year.

The congregation has authorized the use of 4% of the Mission Endowment Fund for scholarships. That translates into \$25000 in the fund to generate one \$1000 scholarship. We currently have approximately \$130,000 in fund value, the equivalent of 5 scholarships. Congregational growth, especially the youth, is happening faster than is the growth of the fund.

Once again thank you and know that our committee is dedicated to making the EPIC Scholarship Ministry continue to serve Good Shepherd.

## LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

Last fall, as part of the ELCA's Truth and Healing Movement, we were asked by the Racial Justice Team to develop a Land Acknowledgement Statement for our congregation. It will not only play a crucial part in combating erasure of Indigenous peoples but also provide a ritual of respect and gratitude for the land and for Indigenous peoples from whom the land was taken.

We drafted a statement that acknowledges the land, the indigenous peoples who lived here, and the impacts of forced removal and assimilation. We also identified what we need to do on our journey, led by the Spirit, to seek truth and healing that honors the land itself and the indigenous people who have cared for it throughout generations. We want to introduce it to you for your consideration:

#### Land Acknowledgement Statement

Forests merge with western grasslands on the rolling hills and bluffs of this midwestern landscape, drained by an intricate system of rivers and streams. This land sustained life, providing food, water, shelter, and medicines for all of its living beings. For more than 10,000 years, it shaped and directed tribal identity, spiritual energy, and continuity of life.

The loway tribe, Wahpeton band of the Dakotah Oyate, Sauk and Meskwaki tribes, and the Ho-Chunk Nation once lived on this life-giving land, holding it sacred and inseparable from their cultural and religious understanding and experiences. Their forced removal and assimilation caused immense suffering and death, shattered indigenous societies, destroyed the cohesiveness of indigenous communities, and destroyed their religious communities and individual identities.

We now live and worship on this land.

- We seek the truth about our history and our religion's role in removal and assimilation.
- We seek a path to healing and understanding, led by the Spirit, that unites us into one community of creation and opens our hearts to hear and understand ourselves and one another.
- We seek to honor, with gratitude and respect, the sacred land itself and the indigenous people who have cared for it throughout generations.

We plan to host one or more Adult Forums to present how we arrived at this statement, to highlight how it can be used (all or in part), and to solicit your input prior to presenting it to Church Council.
